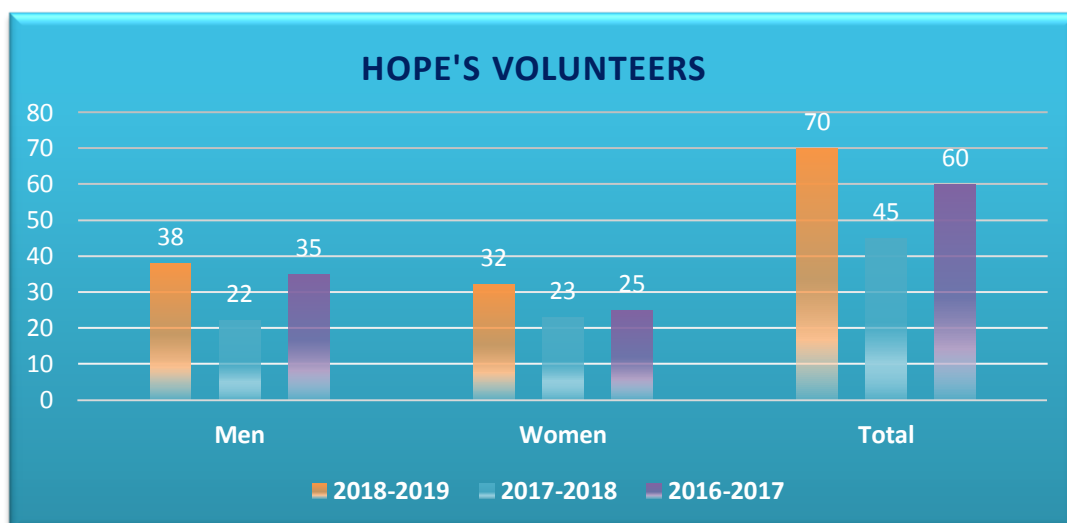
HOPE Outreach and Projects

Country wise progress

1. Pakistan

HOPE Worldwide-Pakistan has been operating in Pakistan in various districts. HOPE has started voluntarily activities in Pakistan to make people aware of its scope of work. Through, the volunteer pool, the Pakistan chapter is very active and has been conducting different activities, workshops, awareness sessions and seminars. Also advocating for their fundamental human rights such as education, health and social protection.



Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR)

HOPE has endeavoured to help and facilitate the poor rural communities to be able to receive basic services and rights that also include their right to be protected from natural and man-made disasters.

The theme of DRR is an integral patron addressing rural poverty and developing infrastructure and livelihood opportunities to sustain any uneven shocks coming from the disasters. HOPE has been playing a key role in raising awareness to deal with challenges such as increasing climate change. In this regard, awareness sessions with communities, meetings with stakeholders, walks and rallies, have been organised and successfully completed.



Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) Sessions

HOPE has initiated its volunteer activities in Badin district, Sindh Pakistan. Badin is prone to natural disasters and in the last two decades, three heavy floods, cyclones and torrential rains have played havoc with the marginalized communities of district Badin and thousands of people have fled to the cities for survival. There were gigantic floods in 2010 and 2011 which made people's lives miserable, and villages were washed away.

In 2003, poor communities of district Badin faced heavy torrential rains, and the same situation was faced again in 2007 and 2008. Due to these disasters, hundreds of poor people died and thousands faced malnutrition and hunger, due to malnutrition. Many small children were killed.

Currently (2019), there is a severe drought in coastal areas of Badin. The marginalized communities in coastal areas do not have water to drink and their agricultural lands have been devastated due to water-logging and sea intrusion. Their livestock have died and people have migrated to cities for their survival.



Against this backdrop, HOPE has organized two DRR sessions in very far-off rural areas of district Badin. In both the sessions, 80 community members participated from about 10 villages and were educated in basic knowledge about DRR.

Community awareness sessions on education

During the reporting period, Mr. Murtaza Talpur (volunteer HOPE) from Badin, Sindh, Pakistan, has organized awareness sessions with communities in rural Sindh, regarding the importance of education. The session was attended by 50 people. This mobilized communities to send their children to schools, because education is one of the significant pillars that can bring social and economic development to the area and help in reduction of stressful poverty.

Reaching the unreachable

There were 25 families who were given HOPE food parcels. The HOPE team appreciate the tireless efforts of Mr. Shahbaz Khan, an enthusiastic volunteer from Dijkot Faisalabad who organized such events.

HOPE has distributed more than 200 pairs of shoes among needy communities in Faisalabad, Rawalpindi and Wah Cant. Beneficiaries included young people, women and school children.

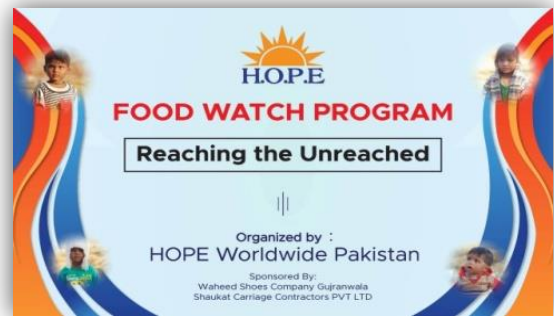


With the generous support of Air China, Auckland office, 23 KG of freight was allowed free of charge to carry from Auckland-New Zealand to Islamabad-Pakistan for poor and needy children.



These donated items included toys, puzzles, stationery and water bottles for children were donated by a local charity in Auckland named “**Education Education Education**”.

With the help of local volunteers all goods were given out to deserving children, who were very happy to receive such support. Waheed Shoes Company Gujranwala Pakistan and Shaukat Carriage Contractors PVT LTD Islamabad were the main sponsors for this program. We have received non cash support to meet the necessary needs. We highly appreciate and acknowledge the great amount of effort that all our dedicated volunteers giving their best efforts have contributed.



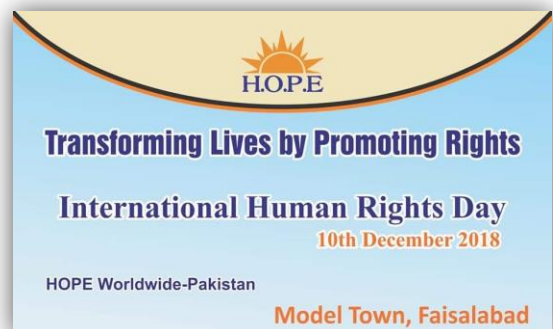
Promoting Volunteerism and Human Rights Education

A one-day workshop was organized at DHA phase IV Islamabad and three groups of Volunteer Coordinators were trained and completed the volunteer induction process. Teams of volunteers representing different cities of Pakistan learnt about the organization’s Code of Conduct and Volunteer Partnership Policy. This helped volunteers to understand the organization and gained up to date knowledge about volunteering with HOPE. Ms. Nasim Gill (Nurse) when sharing her views said that “volunteerism in our society is waning; this is a good attempt of promoting volunteerism.



In addition, to developing the sense of equality in human-beings and to highlight free will, Human Rights day was celebrated on 10th December 2018 at Faisalabad.

Mr. Sajawal and Mr. Kashif were the lead organizers of the event. The event was participated in by civil society



organizations, social activists, and human rights advocates to share their views. Importantly, it is appreciated that fundamental human rights are being discussed here, in which our society treats too lightly.

The event left an impact on participants and they promised to safeguard human rights issues via volunteerism.

Furthermore, the event organizers discussed in detail about membership, its roles and responsibilities. Knowing that various community members showed their interest to be part of HOPE Worldwide-Pakistan for their contribution and volunteerism for a great cause.



International Women's Day

"Women's Day" is an internationally recognized event, which is celebrated throughout the world to pay tribute to all women without any distinction of colour, creed and caste. HOPE Worldwide-Pakistan celebrated this day in two cities: Faisalabad and Rawalpindi on 8th March 2019 to acknowledge the dignity and honour of women for their commitment and service in all facets of life.

Mr. Sajawal, Mr. Kashif in Faisalabad and Ms. Kiran Pervez led the event in Rawalpindi and introduced the HOPE Worldwide-Pakistan's vision, mission and thematic areas and its geographic coverage.

They said that the organization has been actively contributing and advocating for the woes of marginalized communities through volunteerism and raising awareness regarding basic human rights.



Mr. Abid Ilyas and Asher Iqbal highlighted the value of women as a Nobel creation of God and true partner of man with biblical references. They further discussed the role of Mother Mary, Eve and Mother Teresa in humanizing and shaping the face of the earth with teaching love, sacrifices and obedience to

God. She said “God created Eve from the rib of man, not from any bone of feet or brain and showed God’s statement of Equality for women.”

2. New Zealand

Celebrate Diversity: World Refugee Day Hamilton (June 2018)

In the commemoration of World Refugee Day, families from refugee backgrounds, migrants and members of the local community gathered to celebrate diversity and world refugee day. The event was organized at Fairfield Baptist Church Hall in Hamilton-New Zealand.

Speakers and leaders from the local community spoke about the efforts and acknowledging the efforts of people who have been forced to leave their home countries. The Team performed games and the social event turned into a family event where everyone had a wonderful time in remembrance of World Refugee Day. All families bought a cooked meal and shared among other family members. We have distributed children’s toys and puzzles donated by an **Education Education Education**, a charity based in Auckland New Zealand.



Food Provision Program

HOPE in collaboration with Bread & Butter bakery and The Salvation Army is running a Food Watch Program in Auckland, New Zealand. The objective of this initiative is to help with the food needs of immigrant families and those from low socio-economic areas, who are facing difficulties in fulfilling their dietary needs due to various reasons.

Our volunteers collect food and bread etc. from Bread & Butter bakery and the Salvation Army and distribute to those who struggle to put food on the table. With both social and environmental benefits, this intervention is a ‘win-win’.



This initiative can also be seen in the light of the Salvation Army seeking to bring salvation to the poor, destitute and hungry by meeting both their “physical and spiritual needs”.

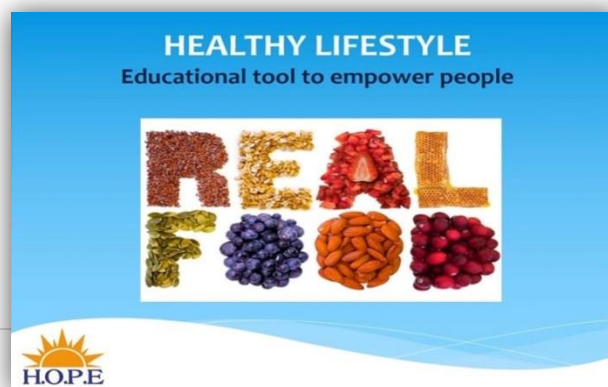
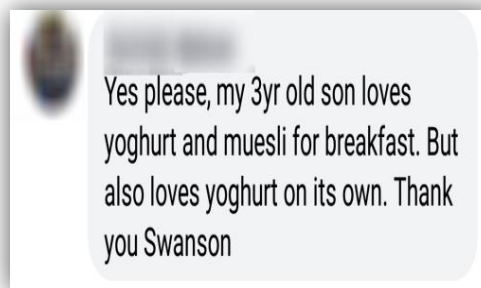
The food watch program is an environmentally friendly program and our mission every week is to have a food parcel given to families with low income or tight budgets and those that struggle to manage their financial situation.

Families from South and West Auckland have been receiving support under this program. Some Families have been supported for a short period of time to cope during their difficult times. The HOPE food provision program has supported more than 300 families who have received food provisions. We post public messages on “Pay it forward” (wider Facebook group) in West Auckland and families who are in need, come to our HQ and collect food.

Healthy Lifestyle Workshop

During the reporting period, HOPE has organized three healthy lifestyle workshops in Auckland, where a diverse group of people participated. The main purpose of organizing these workshops was to provide information to people on how to take control of their own diet and lifestyle choices so that they spend longer years of their lives with good health and vitality “whole of life vitality and health empowerment”.

During the sessions, the participants were told that apart from healthy eating and diet, they also needed to understand the importance of regular exercise. The participants were highly motivated and requested that such sessions need to be organized on a regular basis so that more people may escape from serious diseases that are escalating worldwide.



3. Thailand

Empowering Refugees through Craft

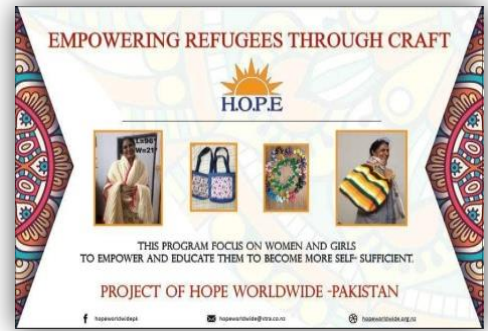
This project is designed to empower urban refugees and asylum seekers in Bangkok-Thailand.

This program is primarily focused on women and young girls to empower and educate them to become more self-sufficient.

These women and girls will be given opportunities to learn new skills that can be used to generate an income, which could lead them to gain confidence and a healthier and more productive lifestyle. We have four groups of women who have been trained to learn craft skills.

In these six-week group sessions, trainees were provided with craft material. We have supported women for their transport to attend classes otherwise they would not be able to afford to come to class.

WELL DONE for our valuable volunteer Josephine Gill who played an enormous role by supporting trainees. In all six-week classes, all candidates who have put their efforts in to learn, attended classes and completed the Craft Course have been awarded with Certificates and been reimbursed for their travel fares. HOPE believes in developing people's strengths and skills and this course had enhanced their skills and confidence to become more self-sufficient.

Social Integration Support Program – Bangkok

In October 2017, we have started a program “Psychosocial Support Program”. This program was developed by Mr. Philip Walker (New Beginning Therapy) to support refugees and asylum seekers in Thailand. The training program was mainly designed to train people around basic counselling skills and the value of 'being there' while also supporting people to work towards certain goals and also giving practical support e.g. food donations and medical expenses. The training program lasted for 3 days.

The people who were trained had been in the situation themselves but had been released into a place of greater stability. They were now in a space where they felt they could support others and due to experiencing what they had, gave them power to be able to give greater empathy.

At the end of this time 3 volunteers were chosen to continue the project. The project has carried on since this time with two volunteers who have been consistently working with stranded families. Families were assessed as to what their main needs are, then they were supported from this point with regular visits. We continue to seek support to fund this project further to allow more volunteers to be able to visit more families. We hope for this to be able to run alongside a greater political awareness of this situation and thereby to promote political change so the families are able to move to another country or to be able to become more integrated into the Thai community

Our volunteers have been visiting families and providing moral support and making sure that families have adequate information to cope during their difficult times. Volunteers did their best to connect families to the appropriate service which was required as per family need. Volunteers were chosen to receive and manage funds that were sent from New Zealand to support families for their food and emergency needs.

It was a long day for me on Saturday as I was coming from work; and the fact that we held the Annual General Meeting (AGM) the previous day made me even more tired and I had to pull myself together in order to attend, since the leadership of the organization had my word the other day that I would come. As soon as I opened the door to enter, I heard the name of the ARCC being called out as one of the organizations that offered support to the event. The welcoming was warm, I quickly scanned the hall and saw that it was lively with enthusiasm, cheering and more diversified as I have never seen before in one particular community. I was ushered to my seat and got a few handshakes with a people I know.

I also shook hands with my acquaintances, and the fatigue was beginning to enlivened and enthusiastic. What struck me the most is how HOPE promotes diversity within the organization? Frankly speaking, I was caught off-guard by the haka performed by a big indigenous group. I felt not only warmly welcomed to the event but to New Zealand. I come from a strong culture where guests are treated superbly. The performance of the haka just encouraged me and made me feel that “humanity” lives within us irrespective of one’s background.

Various groups of different ethnicities performed amazing shows. In the view of the communities from refugee backgrounds, the diversity is a great asset that needs encouragement. I am glad to see it in full swing within HOPE Worldwide-Pakistan.

As someone originally from a country torn by a long and deadly civil war, mixing with other races gives me peace of mind, self-reflection, connectedness and solace. The food was awesome and abundantly served. The atmosphere was very friendly; it was the kind of an atmosphere that doesn’t come so often. I only wish the rest of the communities could imitate this encouragement of diversity. It was a fantastic evening and i am happy that I was part of the whole show!

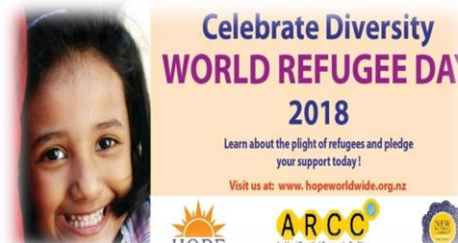
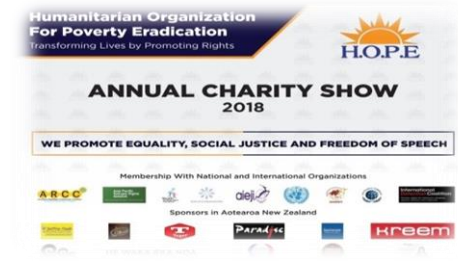

Case studies

Sanjeeda (not real name), 40 years old, has four children, lives in Thailand for three years. Because her husband is sick and had a severe accident in Thailand, she is unable to support her family. She is the only bread-winner in her family. Her husband is confined to a bed, relying on support from charities and other support groups. Sanjeeda has also applied for asylum with UNHCR.



She says that being poor means that her whole life is spent struggling for the survival. Distressing poverty shatters the lives of the poor because they hardly make ends meet. Sanjeeda has been enduring this lifestyle. She, with sad eyes remarks that we have been facing many difficulties and hardships because of no job and a language barrier and every month struggles to meet the family's needs.

In this hard situation, she met with HOPE team members and was informed about the organization and its programs. She was given the opportunity for six weeks training in craft work under “Empowering Refugees through Craft” Program. HOPE bore all the expenses. She remarks that ***“I have enjoyed the six-week program and also have received a certificate from the organization”***.

Furthermore, she explains that *“the HOPE craft program has enhanced my embroidery skills and I have learnt to make new and different craft products such as hand bags, shawls, sweaters, and socks”*.

After making all these products, it is very important to have access into the market so that she could earn reasonable prices. With the efforts of the HOPE team, she was able to have access to the market.

“Now I am selling these products and am able to earn enough for providing bread for my children”, says Sanjeeda.

Finally, she thanks the HOPE team for increasing her skills regarding craft and prays that the organization may bloom and work for all those needy women and increase their skills and help them to be independent.

Way forward/Future strategy

Over the last few three years, HOPE has been actively working in Pakistan, Thailand and New Zealand for poverty eradication and socio-economic development. The organization reaches out to the marginalized and needy communities through its volunteer pool and core programs team, who raise funds, manage the overall organization's operation and also manage volunteers. Furthermore, the volunteers mobilize communities, make them aware of their challenges and organize actions for better future actions.

For long-term achievement and sustainable development, the organization is highly motivated to enable poor communities so that they become self-sufficient for their social and economic development.

In these regards, the organization will design a plan of action that will enhance the skills of local communities so that they can easily manage their "poverty like" situation and earn sufficient livelihoods.

Moreover, the organization is committed to work for community-based disaster risk management (CBDRM) and disaster risk reduction (DRR) to provide local communities awareness and strategy for disaster preparedness and risk reduction. Besides this, it will help the community to reduce its vulnerabilities and strengthen people's capacity to identify and cope with hazards. This thematic area of HOPE is aligned with SDG 13 'Climate Action'.

This year, the organization will be developing its country-wise project or program implementation methodologies. It will define its geographic regions of work and focused thematic areas so that volunteers and teams need to be clear and focused whilst organizing any event or program.

Therefore, more active and vibrant volunteers need to be added to the organization.

An e-newsletter that may highlight the activities should be published on the website quarterly.

Moreover, the organization will raise Expressions of Interest for implementation partners (IPs) to delegate and organize the tasks and activities. Though, this work has already started to find IPs. In Pakistan, HOPE will have meetings with Sindh provincial government officials for a memorandum of understanding to initiate social and economic development work in Sindh.

Funding is the main constraint, therefore, fund raising activities should be multiplied and a team of program development workers needs to be devised to explore funding opportunities and write project proposals.
