

Kotahitanga: Kiwi Connections

Bridging Cultural Diversity in New Zealand





















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Introduction

HOPF Worldwide-Pakistan launched the "Kotahitanga: Kiwi Connections" project with the goal of bridging cultural diversity in New Zealand by promoting understanding and respect for Māori culture and heritage. This initiative was designed to support integration of migrants, refugees, and asylum seekers, fostering a sense of belonging and unity within the community. The project was made possible through the generous support of our partners and sponsors, including The Trust.

Executive Summary

This report provides a comprehensive overview of the "Kotahitanga: Kiwi Connections - Bridging Cultural Diversity in New Zealand" project, implemented by HOPE Worldwide-Pakistan. The project aimed to foster cultural understanding, social inclusion, and community engagement among migrants, refugees, asylum seekers, and individuals from diverse ethnic backgrounds. Key activities included visits to the Treaty Grounds, Marae visits, Treaty of Waitangi workshops, and a National Hui. Project Activities and Implementation

Treaty Grounds Visit

HOPE Worldwide-Pakistan organized a day trip to the Treaty Grounds, bringing together migrants, refugees, asylum seekers, and individuals from diverse ethnic backgrounds. Participants were welcomed with a traditional Māori Powhiri, followed by a guided tour of the Treaty House and Te Kōngahu Museum of Waitangi. This experience deepened participants' understanding of New Zealand's history and fostered new relationships within the community.

Special Marae Visit

HOPE Worldwide-Pakistan organized a special Marae visit to further integration and cultural appreciation. The event brought together refugees, asylum seekers, and new members under the Community Refugee Sponsorship Program. Participants engaged in interactive workshops, language sessions, and cultural performances, all within the sacred space of the Wharenui (meeting house). The visit strengthened community ties and provided an immersive experience in Māori culture.

Treaty of Waitangi Workshops

A series of Treaty of Waitangi workshops were conducted to educate participants about the significance of the Treaty in New Zealand's history and its ongoing relevance. These workshops included discussions on Māori customs, traditions, and values, and featured expert facilitators who guided participants through interactive learning sessions.

National Hui

A National Hui was held to bring together diverse community members for a day of dialogue, collaboration, and cultural exchange. The Hui focused on fostering relationships, building understanding, and celebrating the rich diversity within New Zealand. Participants shared their experiences, learned from one another, and formed lasting connections that contribute to a more inclusive society.









































Measuring Success and Outcomes

Outcome 1: Enhanced Cultural Understanding

Indicators: Pre- and post-event assessments showed significant increases in participants' knowledge of Māori culture and the Treaty of Waitangi.

Achievements: Participants demonstrated a deeper appreciation for Māori heritage, as reflected in survey feedback and testimonials.



Outcome 2: Improved Social Inclusion

Indicators: Follow-up surveys indicated a strong sense of belonging among participants, with many reporting new friendships and community connections.

Achievements: The project successfully integrated participants into the broader community, reducing feelings of isolation.



Indicators: Higher attendance and participation rates in community events post-project.

Achievements: The project led to sustained engagement, with participants actively involved in subsequent cultural and community activities.
